#### \*President Wright to Step Down in 2009

Several weeks ago President Wright announced that he will be stepping down following the 2009 Commencement. A search committee, headed by Trustee Al Mulley '70 will be looking for his successor, and the composition of that committee will be announced sometime later this spring. During the coming year we will all have time to reflect on the accomplishments of the Wright Administration, and Jim Wright's service to the College.
