That's 153 students who persevered through coronavirus restrictions, health uncertainties, drought, and at times, hunger, to obtain this coveted prize.

The commencement was attended by U.S. board members Angelo Maker and Mary Cassidy-Anger, as well as South Sudan Foundation members Dr. Moses Matur Chol and Dr. Benjamin Achiek. We also heard encouraging words from members of parliament, state government officials, local chiefs, fellow secondary school leaders, and countless family and friends. First Annual Abukloi Alumni Reception



On March 15, Abukloi Foundation hosted a reception for Abukloi Secondary alumni living in Juba. Some older attendees believed this was the first time anything like this has been done in South Sudan. The event was attended by over 30 alumni and 40 others including parents of graduates, Members of Parliament, Ministers of Lakes States (where the school is located), and South Sudan and US Abukloi Foundation board members.

The theme of the evening was to encourage alumni to be the change they need. Foundation board member Dr. Benjamin Achiek said, "education is about building the character of learners and it was for this reason Abukloi was established." Hon. Chiguor Adong, MP-Tonj East, thanked the board members and American donors for their commitment and dedication to the school. He said, "support given to Abukloi is not to the people of Rumbek alone, but to our country at large." He described the alumni as the "source" of the solution to every problem South Sudan has. One of the highlights of the night were words given by comedian <u>Akau Jambo Puondak</u>. Akau told the story of how he worked his way from a refugee camp in Kenya to appearing in international comedy festivals. He implored the audience not to wait for help but to make opportunities happen for themselves.

After many encouraging speeches everyone had time to socialize over a meal.





Meeting the Minister of Education

While in the capital Juba, Angelo and Mary were able to secure a meeting with the Hon. Awut Deng Acuil, Minister of General Education. The Hon. Acuil has been a champion of peace initiatives since raising her children while a widow during the 1980's civil war. She has been a member of parliament since 2010. Upon independence she was appointed as a member of the Cabinet of South Sudan. Since then she has served her country as Minister of Labor and Public Service, Minister of General Education and Instruction.

Mary began the conversation by thanking the honorable minister for giving her time to those from Abukloi Foundation. She commented that, "education is one of the areas America is very passionate about." She assured the minister that Americans' are committed to helping South Sudan succeed, but that, "Abukloi is a school run by South Sudanese for South Sudanese." Angelo Maker noted that, "we are looking forward to building a legacy for all South Sudanese and not a single tribe."

The Hon. Acuil explained her vision for education throughout the country citing teacher training as a priority. She is a aware of the excellent reputation of Abukloi Secondary School and affirmed that we have her complete support in reaching our goals. She said,

America stood with us during our liberation struggle with Sudan leading to our independence. It is something we can never forget as a nation. We know the American government has always been with us . . . We support any partner in education. In ten years, you will smile for the huge impact you have made in this country."
